"Building a Risk Register for a Mining Project"

Risk registers have become the norm on the smallest and largest of development and construction projects to measure, manage and mitigate uncertainty. When completed, the risk register is a "snapshot in time" about what a project has to do right NOW to not only manage and mitigate risks, but also, to identify and capture opportunities. The risk register is meant to be a dynamic tool in support of the strategic and project execution plans. Frequent revisits are advised to update and amend when "things change". This workshop is for mining people who wish to participate in a facilitated, collaborative process to design a useful and efficient way to identify, assess, rank and qualify risks on mining projects. An iterative process, with few conditions to constrain input will bring the participants collective knowledge into a comprehensive "bottom up" risk register that can serve as the basis for a formalized risk management plan.
